# 2013-2014, A YEAR OF GROWTH AT THE MAISON DU PÈRE

- We inaugurated 31 newly renovated social reintegration units (this program's intake capacity has now been doubled).
- We established partnerships with organizations involved in homelessness, mental illness and addictions with a view to providing transitional housing.
  - The intake procedure for new users of the Shelter was improved to avoid chronic use.
  - At the Résidence J.A. DeSève, we introduced tools and practices to meet the new certification standards for seniors' residences.
- Agreements were reached to enable our community health care team to partner with the physical and mental health network.
- We partnered with volunteer resources working toward improved well-being and social activities.
  - We won a Réseau de la santé et des services sociaux award of excellence 2013-2014 edition for the Greater Montréal region.
  - A service agreement was reached with the Office municipal d'habitation de Montréal for the management of a 56-unit rooming house scheduled to be inaugurated in early 2015.



### MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN



I have sat on the Board of Directors of the Maison du Père since 2000. Over the years since then, I have seen our organization evolve, along with its ability to adapt to the growing needs of the clientele it serves. I have also observed the complex issues facing the men we help, and the fact that they are aging.

I have the good fortune of being supported on the Board by women and men who are willingly using their professional experience to serve the cause of the homeless by ensuring that the Maison du Père is well run and able to adapt its services to suit its users' needs.

When we get involved in new projects, we make sure we have found the necessary funds, and secured them for the long term. This way, we ensure the continuity of our services — and that is the case with the projects on the table right now. But I am concerned about the housing issue since, when we undertake to provide social support to our clients, it is precisely to give them a roof over their heads. A permanent roof. Emergency housing should be just that: for emergencies. The community network alone cannot meet the housing challenge; we already, like many of our partners, ask a lot of our private-sector partners and our donors in order to develop alternatives and suitable support for our clients.

The Maison du Père celebrates its 45th anniversary this year. Over time, it has developed new ways of meeting the needs of its clientele. There is no one approach that works for all homeless people. We have to be creative to find the many different solutions to the challenges that face **each and every one** of these individuals.

I salute our teams for their ability to constantly reinvent themselves and tirelessly seek new solutions. We will continue to support them and are confident that we can rely on the loyalty of our donors to make this possible.

### MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL DIRECTOR



In the year just ended, we completed several projects that are all designed to make it easier for homeless men to return to society. Our community health care team provides outstanding assistance to our clinical teams in assessing the mental and physical health of the men who stay with us, either as participants in our programs or as convalescents recently released from hospital. This means that our front-line staff can now count on receiving professional support, which they greatly needed, given the ever increasing complexity of the issues facing our users.

We have added 30 units for those who need a time of transition in order to find work, housing or a way back into society. Our greatest challenge remains the lack of affordable housing. It is also an undeniable fact that that our clientele is aging and that finding work after the age of 50 is a major challenge, even without having experienced an episode of homelessness. All the more so when you have found yourself on the street.

In 2014, we reached a partnership agreement with the Office municipal d'habitation de Montréal for the renovation of a rooming house that will enable us to offer 56 men decent, affordable housing under the AccèsLogis program. We are confident that with the housing support our teams can provide, we will be able to offer residential stability to men who have been homeless or are at risk of becoming homeless. We expect these housing placement and support services to expand considerably in the coming years. For this to happen, however, we must be able to count on our government and social partners.

We are also seeing that the homeless population is aging, here as elsewhere. We intend to utilize our more than 25 years of experience with homeless seniors to continue to offer them housing suited to their needs, and we hope to be able to further develop the services we provide for this very vulnerable group.

Finally, we would like to emphasize our support for the initiatives of the current municipal administration, led by Mayor Denis Coderre, to reduce homelessness in Montréal. We are counting firmly on his leadership to see concrete solutions finally implemented and measured. We will give him our full cooperation.

### MAIN CAUSES CITED

- n Release from an institution → 21 %(prison, therapy, hospital)

- ♠ Among users recorded in 2013-2014, 29% had never turned to our Shelter before.
- **31% of these new users** had **no source of income**, hence the importance of our referral service.
- The new users' average length of stay is markedly shorter than the average for previous users—evidence of the effectiveness of our approach toward this clientele.
- 90% of users of the Shelter have incomes well below the poverty level.
- **87%** of the men we take in present **severe employment constraints** (addictions, physical or mental health issues, age, etc.).
- The men who turn to our Shelter are growing older and older; on average, they are 48 years old. These statistics reflect the aging curve of the population in general.

### **OBSERVATIONS**

- 80% of our users have a low level of education, while the job market increasingly favours knowledge attested by certificates and diplomas.
- ★ 64% of our participants are aged 45 or over. They are consequently often victims of age discrimination in the workplace.
- **66%** of our users have a criminal record.

### IN SPITE OF ALL THAT,

- **† 74% of our participants have found a job** or been able to benefit from an internship—14% more than last year.
- † 79% of our participants have found housing or been relocated to a resource that better meets their needs.



### THE RESIDENCE

### CLIENTELE

- ★ Men aged 55 and over, under trustee service
- Have experienced or been at risk of experiencing homelessness

### **STATISTICS**

- More than 80% of residents have physical health problems (high blood pressure, diabetes, high cholesterol, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease).
- ★ 52% have mental health problems (schizophrenia, depression, anxiety, etc.).
- 35% have reduced mobility.
- ★ 20% have had to be relocated during the year, mainly because of deteriorating health.

- The men who turn to our emergency Shelter are growing older and older. The increased demand for accommodation in the Residence is critical and requires immediate attention.
- The clinical and psycho-social supervision services provided to our residents improve their quality of life and have an impact on their life expectancy.
- However, the longevity of our residents entails more regular assistance and more frequent medical follow-up.

### **MAIN OBJECTIVES**

- ♠ Avoid a return to homelessness
- maintain self-sufficiency in terms of housing
- Avoid abuse and/or violence toward them

- ⊕ Budget management is a major service in maintaining housing self-sufficiency for the men we serve:
   80% of users want to take advantage of it.
- ★ 24% of our clients under trustee service turned to us to intervene with their landlords in order to avoid eviction
- **21%** occasionally need to call upon the Maison du Père's **food services** because of their precarious financial situations.
- **17%** relied on us to accompany them to medical appointments.
- in-home assistance for those at risk of becoming homeless calls for the availability of clean, affordable housing. But the needs remain critical. The average wait time for low-cost housing is three and a half years.
- ★ Maintaining housing self-sufficiency through inhome assistance avoids significant health and social service costs.

### SERVICES PROVIDED

- Because of their lifestyle and the lack of aftercare housing, few of the men are able to comply with the prescribed dosages or required follow-up, or adhere to the recommended treatment.
- The examinations conducted by our clinical team reveal that 51% of the men enrolled in our social reintegration programs in 2013-2014 had a physical health issue and 39.6%, a mental health issue. Stabilizing our participants' physical and/or mental health is a key element in their reintegration process and in achieving their goals.
- The convalescent wing recorded 2,086 bed-nights in the past year. Its occupancy rate was 91% during the cold weather.
- The presence of nursing staff able to make a more precise assessment of our users' health has allowed the Maison du Père to strengthen ties, or even forge new ones, with health professionals. Our users consequently have easier access to the resources they need because they receive referrals and follow-up that guide them through the maze of the health network.


